

A message from Bishop Robert:

Following the departure of Canon Dr Andrew Braddock on 8th January 2023, for the next three months, alongside my ministry as Bishop of Tewkesbury, I will be the Interim Dean of the Cathedral as we await the arrival of our newly appointed Dean after Easter of Canon Andrew Zihni who takes up his ministry as Dean of Gloucester Cathedral soon after Easter.



Canon Andrew Zihni:

Andrew was born and grew up in Hong Kong, before moving to the UK with his family. He trained for ordination at St Stephen's House, Oxford, and was ordained Deacon in 2002 and Priest in 2003. He began his ordained ministry in the former mining town of Goldthorpe in South Yorkshire, before moving to St George's Chapel, Windsor, where he was a Minor



Canon and School Chaplain. Andrew then moved to Southwark, where he was Assistant Director of Vocations in the Diocese of Southwark and Honorary Minor Canon at Southwark Cathedral before becoming Canon Precentor in January 2021. He was also a Priest Vicar at Westminster Abbey from 2018 to 2021.

A word from the scriptures:

1 Corinthians 12:1-11 (NIV)

Concerning Spiritual Gifts:

12 Now about the gifts of the Spirit, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. ² You know that when you were pagans, somehow or other you were influenced and led astray to mute idols. ³ Therefore I want you to know that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, "Jesus be cursed," and no one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. ⁵There are different kinds of service, but the same

Lord. ⁶ There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work.

⁷ Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. ⁸ To one there is given through the Spirit a message of wisdom, to another a message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, ⁹ to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit, ¹⁰ to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues, and to still another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹ All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one, just as he determines.

Yesterday's was helpful too, from Gloria Gaither,

"God's will for my life is not a neat box on the path, but the path itself – a pilgrimage to be discovered by trust and obedience."

Trust and obedience I sometimes find difficult but reading in Psalm 122 this morning it strikes me with hindsight that, even in this last difficult year church-wise, many of my best times have been ministry linked.

Historical Snippets: Taken from the archives at St Johns Church, Slimbridge.

Introduction: Years ago, each of the local parish churches submitted their news to something called 'The Parish Magazine', contributors came from quite a large area including: Lower Cam; Coaley; Eastington; Frocester; North Nibley; Stinchcome; Frampton; Saul; Freetherne; Whitminster and *Slymbridge. It was printed for the cost of 2d [tuppence] per copy. Therefore, this item was found in the archive addition for Slymbridge dated— February 1949'.

*Slymbridge is the old fashioned spelling for Slimbridge

My dear People, [February 1949]:

Notes: As this month draws to a close, the season of Lent will be commencing. Wednesday March 2nd on ASH WEDNESDAY. A service for children will be held in church at 4 o'clock, and an evening service for adults at 7.30pm. On Wednesday evening during the season there will be a short service of Compline, after which there will be a reading of a chapter from a Lent book.

The presentation to Sargent N J Gibson of Tewksbury, late of Cambridge, took the form of an illuminated address, together with an album containing the names of subscribers. In acknowledging the gift, Sgt. Gibson made the remark that although he had lived in a good many places in the county of Gloucester, he had never yet found a place where church life was so happy as it is here in Slymbridge.

We tender our best wishes to Mr and Mrs J F Brown (Nee June Smith) on the occasion of their marriage. It was very unfortunate that they have been obliged to leave the Parish to get living accommodation, as they were both regular attendants at the Parish Church services, and will therefore be missed. But we hope they will still be able to come sometimes.

We express our sympathy with our licensed Reader, Mr H C Tocknell, and all the members of his family, in the loss they have sustained by the death of both father and mother in one week. Henry and Emily Tocknell, were very well known throughout the whole neighbourhood. We also extend sympathy to the widow and relatives of the late Charles Chadwick Rowley, of Bristol Road, Cambridge. May God grant to them Rest and Peace.

The members of our choir, their wives, families and friends had a most enjoyable outing to the Pantomime at the Bristol Hippodrome, thanks to the excellent arrangements made by our good friend, Mr Vic Ward. All who went enjoyed it thoroughly. The same can be said of two other most enjoyable social functions, viz,. the bell ringers dance and supper. Both were very successful owing to the excellent arrangements carried out by Mr H J Hobbs, Mr T Hall and Mr D Tocknell.

Will all members of the congregation who support the mission to Lebombo please see that there collecting boxes are sent or brought in to be opened on Sunday, February 13th. One or two new subscribers would be welcomed.

Mr O E Hill, the organist, was responsible for a visit again this year of the Frampton Players, who provided a splendid programme, the children's dancing being particularly good, and much enjoyed.

Have you ever thought of smiling as a form of kindness and love? Kindness can be shown in many ways as reflected in these kindness poems, but smiling is also a form of kindness.

Sue's Garden Snippets for February 2023:

Now is the time to prune your roses. Bush roses should be goblet-shaped, open in the centre, last year's stems cut back to 6-8 inches to an outward facing bud, stems growing into the centre removed. Tall shrub roses can be reduced by 4 inches all over and one-third of old, gnarled stems cut off at the ground, or pruned like bush



roses. Climbers should have their stems trained horizontally, with all shoots growing from these cut to two buds. Early spring and summer flowering ramblers produce blooms on the previous year's growth and should be pruned immediately after flowering, not now.

Once pruning has been completed, mulch around the plants with a generous helping of organic matter, 2" deep but not touching the plants themselves. Flower borders and vegetable beds should also be thickly mulched now. This improves the health of the soil, retains moisture and helps to reduce annual weeds.

Plan where you are going to site your hammock for summer!

Candlemas

Candlemas Day is celebrated on 2nd February. It is also known as the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary or the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus Christ. It is a Holy Day in the Christian religion, which commemorates when



Jesus was presented at the Temple. This account can be found in Luke 2:22-40 of the Bible.

This ancient festival marks the midpoint of winter, halfway between the Winter solstice (shortest day) and the spring equinox in the northern hemisphere.
